

The Town of Eliot continues to mourn the loss of Public Works Director Steve Robinson.

His forty-four years of service to the Town of Eliot will stand as sign of his enduring commitment to his community.

Director Robinson rose through the ranks of the Public Works Department and was chosen to lead the organization as Director. He was respected by his staff, his colleagues and the residents of Eliot. As we continue to try to fill the tremendous void created by this loss, we cannot think to imagine the anguish his wife Ellen, son Chris and the entire Robinson family have suffered with his passing.

The organizational loss continues to reverberate through the entirety of the municipality, but was acutely felt by his crew. They each held him in high esteem and clearly saw him as their leader. NOTICES

NOTICE OF STREET REQUIREMENTS

Any property owner who is planning to hot-top a driveway connected to any highways should contact either the Public Works Director or the State Highway Supervisor according to jurisdiction it may be necessary to correct a drainage problem or to prevent a condition, which might be objectionable or hazardous to traffic. Anyone planning a street with the intention of requesting the Town to accept it as a public way should first obtain information as to the requirements of the Town as to width of right-of-way, construction and drainage, etc.

NOTICE FOR BOAT MOORINGS

All boat moorings within tidal waters of the Town of Eliot must be approved by and registered with the Harbormaster.

ASSESSOR'S NOTICE

All taxpayers are requested by the Municipal Assessor of Eliot to furnish true and perfect lists of all their properties in Eliot, which they possessed on the first of April 2023. If any resident does not furnish this list, he is hereby barred to his right to make application to the Assessor, or any appeal there from, for any abatement of his taxes. The Assessor will accept such list brought or mailed to the Town Office from April 2 to April 30 during regular office hours.

NOTICE FOR ALARM SYSTEMS

Any resident with either a burglary alarm system or fire alarm system in his/her house or business is requested to contact the Eliot Police Department. The Department has forms to fill out so that the Police will be aware of your system. This information will aid in response to your alarm.

NOTICE

For efficient emergency service, all houses should have properly displayed house numbers. Reflector signs for house number may be purchased from the Fire Department, applications available at the Town Office.

NOTICE

The Town will provide any reasonable accommodation for any disabled resident to attend any Town function or meeting. Please notify the Town Manager at Town Office of the need. This is in accordance with the ADA Law.

NOTICE FOR OUTDOOR RECREATIONAL FACILITY USE

The Public Works Department is responsible for the management of the Dixon Road Recreation Area, Boat Basin, Frost Tufts Park, and William Murray-Rowe Park. All park related business should be referred to the Public Works Director at (207) 439-9451. The Community Service Department is responsible for all park and pavilion reservations to include the use of athletic fields. All reservation questions should be directed to the Community Service Director at (207) 451-9334.

The Board of Selectmen, in order to protect and maximize the use of the Town's recreational facilities, has adopted policies and procedures for the operation of these facilities. Copies of these policies and procedures are available at the Community Service Department.

Effective **April 1, 2012** the Eliot Community Service Department adopted a "Carry-In, Carry-Out" policy for waste management at the fields and parks in Eliot. Trash & recycling barrels will no longer be provided at the Town of Eliot's Facilities; therefore visitors, spectators, and all who use the Town's Recreational Facilities will be asked to carry-out their waste, and dispose of it in a proper manner, or to recycle it when applicable.

Reservations for the private use of the pavilion at the Boat Basin and Frost Tufts Park are made at the Community Service Department. Fees are collected seven days per week from May 1st to the Monday of Columbus Weekend. Reservations must be made in advance. Phone reservations are no longer accepted. You may request a reservation online at <u>www.eliotcsd.com</u>.

Boat launch fees are collected at the Boat Basin from Friday of Memorial Day Weekend through Labor Day. Collection of fees will occur on Fridays, Saturdays, Sundays, and any holiday that falls on a Monday. Fees are collected from 5:00am-5:00pm. Season passes can be purchased at the Boat Launch starting April 1st and at the Boat Basin when fees are collected. (Residents, \$10.00 per launch and \$100.00 Season Pass; Non-residents, \$20.00 per launch and \$200.00 Season Pass, (\$50.00 discount for Veterans and Seniors over 65). At no time may disabled boats, vehicles, equipment, or any other means block access to the ramp.

Reservations for league or private use of the athletic fields and courts are made at the Community Service Department. Reservations are taken for the current calendar year only. The public will still have free access to the fields and courts if they have not been reserved. Please note that the Department will not rent out the tennis courts or basketball courts to the extent that the public does not have free daily access.

THE ELIOT RECYCLING PROGRAM



The object of recycling is to place materials that used to be thrown away back into the productive economy where they can be made into useful products. By doing this we eliminate the amount of costly disposable trash. To use the Transfer Station on Route 236 you must obtain a permit (free) at the Town Hall during normal business hours. However, replacement permits for the same registration number will be charged a fee of (\$1.00) one dollar.

WE HAVE A COMMUNITY RESPONSIBILITY

Each of us must be responsible citizens and do our part to recycle and process our own trash. Trash handling fees, called tipping fees, are very expensive and the more trash we move out of the waste stream the more money we will save. The Transfer Station saves thousands of tax dollars each year through our recycling effort. In addition, we are doing something positive for our environment when we recycle.

PAY-TO-THROW

At their regularly scheduled meeting on 3/13/2014, the Board of Selectmen approved continuing Pay-tothrow on a permanent basis.

Approved Town of Eliot Bags are required for disposal of trash (MSW) at the Transfer Station.

TRANSFER STATION TEMPORARY PERMITS

Temporary permits to Eliot residents using a vehicle registered out-of-town may be issued by the Town Clerk, or agent, for a period not to exceed thirty (30) days. Registration numbers for the vehicle and the Eliot address will be required. Permits will be turned into the Attendant at the Transfer Station at any time.

An Eliot resident may obtain one-day permits through the Town Clerk's Office for a contractor or temporary help in his employ to haul appropriate waste from his property. Under normal circumstances, three (3) days advance notice and registration numbers for the vehicle to be used will be required. Permits will be turned in to the Transfer Station Attendant.

Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the U.S. Senate. I am grateful for the trust that Mainers have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments for our state.

Last year, I secured more than \$500 million for 285 projects from Aroostook County to York County that will promote job creation, workforce training, and economic development; expand access to health care; improve public safety, infrastructure, and community resources; and protect our environment. To address the crisis of soaring inflation and high energy prices, I led efforts to provide \$2 billion in supplemental funds to the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program. In the new Congress that begins in 2023, I expect to be the Vice Chairman of the Appropriations Committee and will continue to champion investments to support Maine's communities and families.

Strengthening our economy and supporting good jobs remain a top priority. Along with the Governor and the rest of the Maine Delegation and the associations representing the lobster industry, I worked to protect our hardworking lobstermen and women by pausing for six years the onerous federal regulations that jeopardize our lobster fishery's very existence. Another ongoing threat to Maine's small businesses is the shortage of workers. That's why I led an effort to push the Administration to nearly double the number of H-2B visas that are critical to our hospitality industry. Additionally, when the Administration proposed to cut the construction of a destroyer to be built by Bath Iron Works, I restored this funding to protect Maine jobs and our national security.

When Maine Veterans' Homes announced last year that it planned to close its facilities in Caribou and Machias, I opposed that decision which would have had such a devastating effect on rural veterans and their families. I am glad that the decision was reversed, and I have secured \$3 million to help with upgrades to these facilities. My *AUTO for Vets Act* also became law, which will help disabled veterans maintain their independence by supporting the purchase of a new adaptive vehicle once a decade.

This past year, Congress demonstrated how effective it can be on behalf of the American people when both parties work together. A few of the bipartisan achievements that I was involved in include the *Respect for Marriage Act*, which will provide certainty to millions of loving couples in same-sex marriages while protecting religious liberties, and the *Electoral Count Reform Act*, which establishes clear guidelines for our system of certifying and counting electoral votes for President and Vice President.

No one works harder than the people of Maine, and I have honored that work ethic by showing up for every vote. During my Senate service, I have cast more than 8,500 consecutive votes, never having missed one. I remain committed to doing all that I can to address your community's concerns in 2023. Dear Friends,

I've often thought that Maine is just one big small town connected by long roads. Well, in the past year or two, those roads have gotten steeper and bumpier as we dealt with an unprecedented pandemic and the resulting economic troubles.

As we faced the historic challenges, something impressive happened. We came together and lent a hand to our neighbors wherever we could to keep things running and spirits high.

Down in Washington, Congress tried to help Maine communities get through this struggle, so that our state would come out stronger. To do that, we put in the work and set some things into motion that are already helping Maine people. That's why you hired us, after all.

The pandemic made something we'd known for a while clear: those roads and networks that connect our big town needed repair, improvements, and expansion – from bridges to broadband. So, while Maine was uniting towards a common purpose, Congress came together to pass the *Bipartisan Infrastructure Law* – legislation that makes generational investments in physical infrastructure, broadband connections, harbors, and the energy grid. These efforts will lay the foundation for Maine's 21st century economy and make sure even the most rural areas aren't left behind.

Over the last two years, as we drove up and down our state, you couldn't help but see storefronts in trouble and prices rising as the economy struggled through a global recession. And again, while you focused your efforts on getting through the difficult times, Congress took meaningful action. We passed the *American Rescue Plan* in 2021, which enabled Governor Mills and the state of Maine to better meet the health and economic difficulties of the pandemic. At a critical moment it expanded healthcare efforts to confront COVID and invested in the state to keep the economy in far better shape than most others nationwide.

Congress didn't stop there. This year, we took even more concrete steps to cut costs, create jobs, and provide more affordable, cleaner energy. The bipartisan *CHIPS Act* will bring home the manufacturing of the technical components known as "chips" that are used in everything these days – from smartphones to microwaves to cars – and in doing so reduce prices and create good American jobs. We also passed the *Inflation Reduction Act (IRA)* to lower healthcare costs, allow Medicare to negotiate drug prices, and cut energy bills with new rebates for things like heat pumps and solar panels.

Beyond these major investments, we also passed vital legislation to improve the day-to-day lives of Maine people and Americans nationwide. On a bipartisan basis, we expanded health care for veterans exposed to toxins, strengthened protections for marriage equality, supported Ukraine as it fought off a bloody Russian invasion, secured our elections and the peaceful transfer of power, and delivered millions in federal investments to projects up and down our state.

So, as Maine worked to get through hard times, Congress took steps to support our state – and we're already starting to see brighter days ahead. I'm proud to have played a small part down here; it's a true privilege to listen to you, work with you, and build a brighter future for all the incredible people up and down the roads that connect our big small town. Mary and I wish you a happy, and safe 2023.

This past year, (2022) has been a game changer for Eliot as we like so many communities entered the post COVID 19 world. The pandemic changed the way we do business in some subtle and some profound ways. Working or attending meetings remotely has become part of the accepted means of participation. "Purple Heart Town" at the Veteran of Foreign Wars Post 9394 request, or partnering with EliotConnects to raise over \$7,000 for the organization and at the same time lowering carbon emission and utility bills for 70 households in town are just a few examples of ways the Eliot Select Board continues to engage in the community.

Police Chief Eliot Moya received the David W. Pickering Award for Maine's Outstanding Police Chief in 2022. His commitment to recognizing how important a healthy mental state is critical to a healthy community is changing the culture in our police department and those around us. He has been a leader on this subject and is recognized across the country for his work on breaking down the barriers constructed from stigma.

Chief Moya has demonstrated exceptional leadership as the Eliot Police Department continues to demonstrate a model of policing forged in community interaction. Using advanced techniques to protect citizens and give them tools to help them stay safe. The Eliot Police Department

continues to have strong relationships with Marshwood Schools through the Student Resource Officer program and other various partnerships.

The Community Service Department continues offer exceptional programing under the coordination of Director Heather Muzzeroll-Roy. With KidsPlay growing in popularity, additions in programing for all ages and abilities the department continues to strive to serve the recreational needs of Eliot.

In the upcoming year we hope to bring forth an investment plan for Hammond, Murray-Rowe, Frost-Tufts, the Boat Basin and possibly add other recreational areas in the Brixham and Goodwin Road area.

Planner Jeff Brubaker is leading the effort to create safe bike and pedestrian routes through a study from Stantec, partnerships with the Eastern Trails Alliance and other regional partners. The Planner is also very engaged in tandem with the Eliot Planning Board in shaping housing and transportation future needs.

The continued efforts of Town Clerk Wendy Rawski, Assistant Town Manager Melissa Albert, Finance Director Kristin McNulty and all the staff in Town Hall should be lauded for their diligent efforts to deliver high level of service to the public.

There has been an emphasis on training and regional participation by administration. This refocus has already started to pay dividends and help to identify where there are needs for service delivery adjustments. Town Hall continues to open to the public 8:30 AM to 3:30 PM Monday through Thursday and by appointment.

The Eliot Select Board worked and succeeded in reaching consensus with the Budget Committee on all the proposed budgetary articles. The Select Board continues to look at efficiencies and innovative methods to control costs, and they remain committed to work with all boards, commissions, departments and the Town Manager to keep Eliot affordable.

The MSAD #35 FY 24 prospective budget as proposed has a modest increase of 2.83%, in comparison the Town of Eliot budget increase is nothing short of impressive at 1.97%. With the Consumer Price Index as a standard measure of inflation hovering at near 9% for much of the last twelve months, it is testimony to the employees, the Budget Committee and the Eliot Select Board for controlling expenses while delivering first rate service to the community.

The Eliot Select Board has amplified transparency this year, by increasing information sharing and accessibility. This year the Select Board has directed the Town Manager to make every transaction, every expenditure, every vendor's payment, every contract signed, every employee's compensation issued and every revenue received, readily available on the town website on a twice monthly basis and through quarterly easy to read reports.

The Town of Eliot remains in a strong financial position and continues to evolve policies and procedures to protect the assets of the municipality. Thank you to the citizens of Eliot for their continued interest and support of good governance.

Introduction

The Eliot Aging in Place (AIP) Committee enters its sixth year of service. Membership has increased to 9 full members. They include Ellen Ceppetelli, Chair; Nedra Sahr, Vice Chair; Michael Thompson, Secretary; Melissa Layman, Treasurer; Maureen Clark, Michele Meyer, Karen Tomanio, and Jennifer Isler. The six domains of the Action Plan guide activities. They are Housing, Transportation, Outdoor Spaces and Buildings, Social Participation, Communication and Information, and Civil Participation and Employment. AIP is in the process of completing its AARP Network of Age-Friendly States and Communities Progress Report due in July. Age-Friendly Communities are required to submit this report three years after action plan submissions. The Eliot AIP Action Plan was submitted in 2020. A copy of the finale report will be provided to the Select Board.

AIP Domain – Housing

"Safe and affordable housing conveniently located near amenities promotes health and wellbeing. Some communities have developed building and zoning codes that encourage lifelong housing or advocated for affordable housing options for different life stages." – AIP Action Plan

Housing

AIP developed the Eliot Senior Tax Assistance Program that was approved by town ballot in June 2020. In FY22, \$20,000 was allocated for this program. During FY23, a total of \$13,391 was approved for 16 of the 29 applicants. The remaining balance of this original allotment is \$3,481. AIP encourages the Select Board to add additional funding to this program for FY 24.

AIP members continue to advocate for safe and affordable housing by actively participating in efforts to update the Eliot Comprehensive Plan (ECP). The AIP monthly newsletter promoted the ECP survey and activities. AIP members attended the March ECP Meeting and Public Input Session. Ellen Ceppetelli serves on the ECP Subcommittee on Housing.

AIP Domain – Outdoor Spaces and Buildings

"Accessible, inviting parks and public buildings affect the independence and quality of life for residents of all ages, but especially older people. They are also good for property values." – AIP Action Plan

AIP continues to enhance the Eliot Boat Basin landscape by planting and tending perennial flowers. With the help of local volunteers, two additional flower beds have been added. The challenge of plant waterings for a dry, hot summer was eased by a collaboration with the Public

Works and Community Services Departments. They placed a 500-gallon water tank accessible to the beds. Timely refills of this tank contributed to successful plant growth and significantly reduced the work of dedicated AIP volunteers. Ann Lukegord advocated for improvement in public spaces on the ECP Subcommittee on Environment, Open Space, and Climate Change.

AIP Domain – Transportation

"Age- friendly communities offer transportation options that improve health, support vibrant neighborhoods, and connect people to economic and social opportunities in their communities. They enable people of any age to reach their desired destinations safely and conveniently." – AIP Action Plan

In 2019, AIP's community survey identified the need for transportation alternatives. Offering a range of affordable and convenient transportation options remains a challenge locally and regionally. Although AIP has not developed solutions to this problem, it remains focused on exploring partnerships and collaborating to do so. Nedra Sahr has been an active member of the ECP Subcommittee on Transportation. Mike Thompson has recently confronted this issue head-on by doing his own research to identify the extent of the problem and availability of services. He took the free York County Community Action's van to shop at Market Basket in Portsmouth. His experience is featured in the AIP March/April newsletter.

Since its inception, AIP has advocated for safer walking and biking in Eliot. In mid-April 2022, AIP submitted a request for AARP 2022 Challenge Grant funds to improve a crosswalk in Eliot center as an opportunity for all residents to move more safely in town. The crosswalk was chosen because of its frequency of use, condition of asphalt surface, signage, lack of ADA compliance ramps and insufficient with landing areas and walkways. Unfortunately, AIP's application was not selected from the over 2500 AARP applications submitted. The committee remains vigilant for future funding opportunities.

AIP Domain - Social Participation

"Connecting with friends and neighbors is good for one's health, no matter one's age. Socially isolated children have poorer health in middle age than their connected peers. Lacking social ties in adulthood is as bad as smoking fifteen cigarettes per day." – AIP Action Plan

Social Participation: AIP Creative Connection

Unexpected circumstances have interfered with AIP's plan to offer the Creative Connection sixweek Zoom-based groups this past year. Vitalizing this creative arts opportunity remains an AIP priority in FY24.

In May, AIP plans to join in AARP's celebration of "Older Americans Month: Aging Unbound". These plans include a gathering at the town gazebo with food, music, and storytelling on May 20th. There will also be two social/educational offerings at Baran Place and open to the public. On May 11th at 11am, Shellie Jenkins from Reform Physical Therapy in Eliot will offer a session

on Balance and Falls with free injury screening. On May 25th at 11am, Rochelle Jewel from Yoga in Action will conduct a session on Chair Yoga for Healthy Aging.

AIP Domain - Communication and Information

"Staying connected with activities, resources, and people is key to active, engaged aging. Agefriendly cities and towns in Maine have developed information portals on the town website, designed Facebook pages, or created age friendly resource manuals that make it easy for people to find information about local activities, services, and programs." – AIP Action Plan

Communication and Information: Creating social media and newsletter avenues to communicate

AIP continues with its comprehensive communication plan that includes a monthly newsletter, Facebook group page, and Instagram account. Begun as a e-newsletter in September 2021, it is now emailed to 253 followers and mailed directly to 26 residents. Hard copies are delivered to Baran Place, Cole Brook Estates, the Maine Market, and the Town Office. The William Fogg Library copies and distributes additional newsletters.

In the past year, AIP Facebook page increased the number of followers by 400% (n=285), and AIP Instagram account has increased by 15% (n=66). AIP Town website continues to serve as a communication home for people to find AIP newsletters and information. Topics sent out via the newsletter, Facebook, and Instagram range from health and wellness news to resources for food, heating, and property tax relief. Posted information is provided from our partners which include the William Fogg Library, Town of Eliot, Eliot Strong, Eliot Connects, Southern Maine Agency on Aging, Maine Agency on Aging, and AARP. AIP will advance these avenues and their reach to best communicate with Eliot residents.

AIP members stay connected to the community by being present at town elections, town committee and Select Board meetings. AIP participates in the Eliot Fall Festival by marching its parade and having a booth that offers information and opportunities for volunteering.

Conclusion

AIP remains committed to its mission. That is, "to provide advocacy for changes in Eliot's physical, economic and social environments that enable residents, especially older residents, to live in their homes as long as possible and that foster the creation of services and programs geared to keeping all residents engaged and active in the community".

REPORT OF THE BUDGET COMMITTEE

Per the Town of Eliot's Charter, Article 6.3, the Budget Committee consists of seven elected members who serve on staggered three (3) year terms. The Budget Committee shall have the responsibility of reviewing and evaluating the Town Budget. This Committee shall function as a sub-committee of, and report back to, the legislative body (the registered voters of Eliot). The Budget Committee shall act independently from the Select Board and Town Manager. The Budget Committee shall, by majority vote of the committee members present and voting, make recommendations regarding and included in each warrant article having a financial impact whether at the Annual Meeting or at a Special Town meeting. One member of the Budget Committee or a designee shall serve as a member of the Town's negotiating team that will negotiate all labor contracts for the Town of Eliot. Note, the town's fiscal year is July 1st through June 30th.

The Budget Committee's regular meetings are scheduled on the second Wednesday of each month. The public is encouraged to attend our meetings and to offer their comments. The public can also view our meetings and participate live via Zoom. Recordings of our meetings are also subsequently available on the Town's website.

During the budget season, roughly January through April of each year, the Budget Committee meets more often as needed. All meeting dates and times are posted, in advance, on the Town's website calendar. (www.eliotmaine.org) During meetings, the Budget Committee reviews and discusses the details included in the proposed annual budget submitted by the Town Manager. Previously, the process also included the Budget Committee meeting directly with the individual department heads and town manager who presented their detailed plans and explanations for the year ahead. These department meetings were not allowed the past two years and hindered the Committee's time efficiency and detailed understanding of certain budget proposals.

In summary, the Budget Committee is recommending expenditures of \$8,658,692 and non-tax revenue of \$4,803,223 both of which are in line with the original budget submitted by the Town Manager. These recommended amounts result in a proposed net spending increase of approximately 2.0% for fiscal year 2024 versus last year's budget.

The Budget Committee's fiscal year 2024 recommended budget is \$299,281 lower than the amount allowed under the State of Maine's Municipal Property Tax Levy Limit Worksheet LD1. Details supporting these recommendations by the Budget Committee will be posted on the Town of Eliot's website. (www.eliotmaine.org).

The Budget Committee thanks the citizens' who shared their ideas and expertise this year, and the Select Board, Town Manager, Town employees, and those members of various Town committees who assisted in creating a sound financial plan for fiscal year 2024.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF APPEALS

The Eliot Board of Appeals hears both Administrative Appeals and Variance Appeals. (The following definitions are from the Eliot Municipal Code of Ordinances, Section 45-49. Powers.)

"Administrative Appeals. The board of appeals shall hear and decide where an aggrieved person or party alleges error in any permit, order, requirement, determination, or other action by the planning board or code enforcement officer. The board of appeals may modify or reverse action of the planning board or code enforcement officer by a concurring vote of at least three members, only upon a finding that the decision is clearly contrary to specific provisions of this chapter."

"Variance Appeals. The board of appeals shall hear and decide cases involving the relaxation of regulations affecting height, area, size of structures, size of yards or open spaces, or other types of variance specifically provided by this chapter. On a case-by-case basis the board of appeals may elect to hear cases involving establishment or change to a different nonconforming use. A variance shall be as limited as possible to relieve a hardship. The board of appeals shall grant a variance where a party establishes that the strict application of provisions of this chapter will cause undue hardship. The words 'undue hardship' mean: (1) that the land in question cannot yield a reasonable return unless a variance is granted; (2) that the need for a variance is due to the unique circumstances of the property and not to the general conditions in the neighborhood; (3) that the granting of the variance will not alter the essential character of the neighborhood and (4) that the hardship is not the result of action taken by the applicant or a prior owner." The applicant must meet all four of the above criteria for a variance to be granted.

The Eliot Board of Appeals also hears cases involving "Practical Difficulty" variances under Section 45-194 (non-conforming lots of record) and "Disability" variances, (see town code.)

The Eliot Board of Appeals meets the third Thursday of the month, when scheduled, at 7:00 PM at the Town Hall with online Zoom coverage. Meetings are open to the public and all are welcome and encouraged to attend. Meetings and meeting minutes are archived online through the Town of Eliot website.

The Board of Appeals met five times in 2022-2023 and held five public hearings. It reviewed one Hardship Variance: denied; three Practical Difficulty variances: denying 2, approving one; one Administrative appeal, approved.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The purpose of the Eliot Conservation Commission (ECC) is to ensure the proper utilization and protection of the natural resources, ecosystems, scenic vistas and open spaces of Eliot; to protect the watershed and wetland resources of Eliot; and to further an awareness and understanding of conservation practices and policies throughout the town of Eliot and the region. Meetings are held the first Wednesday of each month and include special topics and occasional guest speakers. The ECC promotes conservation awareness through expanded use of the town website and through social media. Educational outreach material is also provided at the town hall and at outreach events.

Throughout this past year, the ECC hosted several educational and community events, including fall and spring trash clean ups. Jeff Parmalee, University of New England, gave a talk at town hall on amphibian migration and the *Maine Big Night* citizen science project. The ECC has since partnered with the University of Maine to establish 3 *Big Night* monitoring sites in Eliot. The ECC also sponsored the Center for Wildlife's New England Natives presentation at the William Fogg Library in April. About 30 parents and kids attended this event to learn all about our local wildlife. In the fall, the ECC hosted a table at Eliot Festival Days. We received feedback from the community on conservation concerns, and we distributed local informational brochures such as the popular *Hiking in Eliot*. We continue to utilize social media as a means to promote conservation events and provide education outreach to our community. We want to send out extra thanks to Daisy Troop #1411 who completed an Earth Day Clean up Event at the Eliot Boat Basin on April 20th 2023. Working with our youngest members of the community is a great way to promote conservation and foster a love of our special natural resources.

As an advisory board, we reviewed and provided comments on projects with potential impacts to natural resources. We continue to monitor building and development applications to ensure that necessary ordinances and protections for natural resources are followed. Several Members of the ECC are also serving on other town/regional committees to promote conservation objectives including the Climate Resiliency Partnership, Comprehensive Plan Update and the York River Wild and Scenic Stewardship Committee. We continue to promote conservation practices that would benefit our community such as the use of native plants and implementation of best management practices to minimize the spread of invasive species. The ECC routinely communicates citizens' concerns and potential natural resource violations to the Town Manager and Code Enforcement Officer for action.

This past year, the Commission maintained a board filled with conservation champions including Peter Egelston, Cyndy Camp, Lisa Wise, Lynn Bubley and our newest member David Marshall. This amazing group of volunteers is working together to continue advancing conservation goals in our community! The commission would also like to thank Carol Castellan for her years of service as a volunteer on the board. In closing, we would like to thank the citizens of Eliot for continuing to support conservation. We hear your concerns and welcome your input to keep us informed about natural resource interests and concerns in our community.

REPORT OF THE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The Historical Society had quite a busy year. Our monthly meetings are on the 2nd Monday of each month, at Macpherson Hall of the Eliot Congregational Church at 7pm. Each month we have an interesting program. You can attend in person or via Zoom. We have upgraded our Zoom capabilities to provide our Zoom participants an excellent experience. Programs this past year included: 1)Blacksmiths of Eliot, 2) 400 Odd years of Eliot History, 3) The Latest on Eliot's Comprehensive Plan, 4)Maine and NH in the 17th Century, 5)Our annual "members show and tell" and 6)Books of Our Childhood. If you missed any of these programs, the video is available on our website at <u>https://eliothistoricalsociety.org</u>

The historical displays at the Elementary School were changed out several times and we also have extended our displays to include the Great Works School in South Berwick. Displays from this past year included: 1)Town Celebrations (centennial, sesquicentennial and bicentennial), 2)Blacksmiths of Eliot, 3)Veterans of Eliot, 4)Now and Then (Objects from the past such as the telephone, records, bottles and shoes) and 5)Books of our Childhood.

Our website and communication abilities are in the process of being updated and expanded. We received a Grant from the Marshwood Education Foundation to improve the seating at the #8 School. Many thanks to the Doug Herrin family for their help in this project. We have expanded our reach further into the community with hope to engage the middle school students, much as we have been able to do with the elementary school, through displays, tours, and offering to find and/or provide speakers on various subjects.

The schoolhouse was open through the summer months and by appointment and will re-open for every Saturday starting in May 2023 through September. We are always looking for volunteers who want to learn more about the history of our town and share it with others.

Our Adopt a Cemetery Program continues to provide healthy exercise and opportunity for community service, as we care for the many of the 171 ancient, private cemeteries in our town. The past summer/fall we had several groups of volunteers who worked at the Spinney, Tetherly, Ferguson, Major Charles Frost and Fernald cemeteries. A good activity for groups of friends and families, we offer it also for high school students seeking community service credits.

The Society, with additional funding from the Mt. Pleasant and Brooks Memorial cemeteries has put together a website where the public will be able to search all the burials in Eliot for location and information and should be of help to the town in keeping track of the status of its private cemeteries.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The Eliot Planning Board is an appointed, quasi-judicial board consisting of five regular voting members and two alternate members. The Planning Board reviews a variety of land-use related applications for compliance with Town ordinances, and is responsible for proposing ordinance revisions to comply with various town and state requirements.

Meetings are held on the first and third Tuesday of every month. The first meeting of the month is for administrative matters, like review of draft ordinance amendments and in-depth discussions of specific planning topics. The second meeting is for review of applications. This meeting schedule can change based on the situation, such as additional meetings to accommodate busy application review times or additional administrative meetings to finalize proposed ordinance amendments for upcoming Town Elections. Public comment is highly encouraged. Planning Board meetings are video-streamed and are available to watch at <u>www.eliotmaine.org</u>.

In FY23, the Planning Board continued to hold regular in-person meetings with a remote videoconference option. Planning Board members also participated in the Town Manager's Summer Summits and served on the Comprehensive Plan Committee, formed in the fall of 2022, which is tasked with updating the Town's Comprehensive Plan. The plan was last updated in 2009.

At the time of writing this report (April 2023), the Planning Board is expected to have held 24 meetings and reviewed at least 23 applications from July 1, 2022, to June 30, 2023. During that time, the Planning Board also reviewed ordinance amendments and the annual growth permit allocation. A detailed breakdown of application types is shown in the following table (some applications comprised more than one type):

For the November 2022 Town Election, five (5) land use ordinance amendments crafted and recommended by the Planning Board were placed on the ballot by the Select Board and approved by voters. These amendments addressed site plan and subdivision approval, vesting, and performance guarantees; erosion and sedimentation control; the Town fee schedule; marijuana licensing and land use land use performance standards; and solar energy systems. For the upcoming (at the time of this report) June 2023 Town Election, the Planning Board crafted and recommended five (5) ordinance amendments. These amendments are related to housing, tiny homes, and accessory dwelling units; child care; marijuana licensing and land use performance standards; mobile vendors; and non-stormwater discharges. The Board also reviewed and approved the growth permit report and allocation for calendar year 2024. The Planning Board expresses its appreciation to citizens, groups, and committees who provided their perspectives on ordinance amendments.

FY 23 saw a lighter overall volume of applications reviewed by the Board compared to the previous fiscal year. However, several applications were more complex or unique and necessitated a more comprehensive review than most, with some incorporating third-party technical consultant review. On April 4, the Planning Board held a retreat, where the Board received a training on quorum and ex parte communications from the Town's legal counsel, followed by an open discussion of planning issues and Planning Board procedures. The meeting was

also attended by SMPDC's Executive Director. In late March and April, SMPDC helped advise the Board while the Town Planner took extended family leave.

The Planning Board has formed a new subcommittee of two members to focus on ordinance amendments. The Ordinance Subcommittee meets occasionally outside of full Board meetings, and reports its work and meetings to the full Board. Overall, Board members devoted substantial volunteer time to fulfilling their civic responsibility on the Planning Board.

Ellen Lemire is the Board's Recording Secretary.

Kim Tackett is the Land Use Administrative Assistant.

Jeff Brubaker is the Town Planner.

REPORT OF MSAD #35 SCHOOL BOARD

The 2021-2022 fiscal/school year was our first since the onset of the pandemic where our students were all back in the buildings. Social distancing rules were relaxed somewhat, and finally, in March of 2022, we went to masks-optional. We ended the 2021-2022 school year in June with a graduation that felt much more like normal.

As was reported last year, pandemic-induced learning loss and social and emotional setbacks caused the district to focus more intently on the health of the whole child. Recent Maine Integrated Youth Health Survey data indicated that 60% of high school students do not feel connected with an adult at school, while 25% of high school students have experienced suicidal ideation. As a result, district goals were refined to focus on the creation and maintenance of a safe, healthy learning environment for all the children in our schools. As well, academic programs have been put in place to remediate losses in learning evidenced by standardized test scores. Goals for the 2022-2023 school year include nurturing a culture of civility, data-driven instruction, and a recommitment to our multi-tier system of support for struggling students.

Other 2022 highlights include:

- The district budget was approved by a wide margin at both the District Budget Meeting in May and the towns' Budget Referenda in the June election.
- The district's critical incident plan was enhanced with the cooperation of first responders from both our towns.
- Sports and extracurricular activities were (and remain) in full swing.
- We renewed our practice of meeting monthly with the town managers to share information, even as we welcomed new town managers in each of our two towns.
- We completed an interior lighting conversion to programmable LED lighting at the high school, resulting in substantial electricity savings.
- We continue our district commitment to outdoor learning; many of the practices developed in response to COVID have carried over into our post-pandemic instruction such as use of outdoor classrooms and outdoor physical education.
- We continue our contractual relationship with the town of Rollinsford, NH, providing 7 through 12 education for some 150 of their students, all of whom are truly and fully Marshwood Hawks.

As always, the smooth operation of our district schools is a direct reflection of the dedication of our educators and all who support them - aides, administrative and custodial staff, bus drivers, food service employees, and our nursing staff. Our district families continue to support our efforts to educate our children. And of course, we are grateful to all the citizens of South Berwick and Eliot who continue to support our district at the polls and through their property taxes.

REPORT OF THE WILLIAM FOGG LIBRARY

The William Fogg Library is an essential community resource for the citizens of Eliot. It builds community, supports literacy, provides access to information through various media, and fosters lifelong learning and enrichment.

The William Fogg Library has grown and thrived in every capacity since turning the corner to 2023. All technology has received a badly-needed upgrade and thanks to expert advice, our systems are more efficient and cost-effective. More than 200 new books have been ordered to replenish and rejuvenate the adult fiction and non-fiction sections, with more acquisitions planned.

The library is back to not just a full schedule but an expanded schedule, and is open evening hours once again. We will be open a second evening in the fall.

Groups are back meeting at the library and regular programming has returned, thanks to a dynamic staff. The library will offer its first Plein Air art event this summer, and we have 20 programs on tap for summer and fall to date, with topics ranging from search and rescue dogs to astronomy and photography. Two book clubs will kick off this summer and fall.

Children's programming is also going full speed with popular programs by children's book authors, Center for Wildlife, and a butterfly expert already underway, plus the amazing Star Wars event, which featured the First Legion of Storm Troopers and Kylo Ren. Storytimes, Lego Club and Dungeons & Dragons Club are all full.

The library has enjoyed a successful return to fundraising with the popular chocolate sale back in February, our well-known book sale and Dr. Fogg's Birthday returning in May, and a Paddington Children's Tea scheduled for June. We will also be hosting a Fairy House event, Haunted Halloween at the Fogg House, Victorian Tea and more.

The library also launched its Green & Beautiful Campaign, which aims to restore the gardens and grounds of the library in time for the 125th anniversary. The campaign also seeks to make the library an ecological ambassador with plantings that support wildlife, pollinators and aid in fighting against climate change. There will also be workshops on activities that support our natural world and every aspect of the plantings will provide a teachable opportunity.

Thank you to our many volunteers, supporters and Friends as well as to our valued staff who have helped the library continue to grow and thrive. Thank you to our donors and memorial givers for remembering us.

To the taxpayers of Eliot, we appreciate your continued support and recognition of the important role the library plays in the community.

We also salute the dedication of the late Sharon Kibat, Trustee, who worked tirelessly for the library. She raised money for the Kent Wing, was a dynamic trustee, and loved being back at the front desk this winter. She will be greatly missed.

The fire department continues to respond to over 300 calls for emergency services by dedicated members. We are an all-hazards department. This requires many hours of preparation and continuous training. We can never predict what the next call will present to us.

This past year we put our newest fire truck in service. It has proven again to be a very worthwhile investment for our responses operating at several structure fires and rescue calls. Our fleet of apparatus is constantly being evaluated to meet our current needs and the needs of the future. Our oldest fire truck is over 20 years old and like anything it will need to be replaced soon because of its serviceability and mounting repair costs. Also alarming is the lead time to replace fire apparatus. Current predictions from manufacturers is greater than 2 years from the time of order. Every year we wait the costs will rise, like everything else. It is quite alarming to witness the escalation of replacement costs, however with the continued support of the citizens and elected officials we believe we can provide a quality piece of equipment at the most reasonable cost with a solid plan to fund it.

The department continues to take pride in our relationships with the other town department. We are all part of a team that works hard to make life a little more bearable. The support and sacrifice of our families and friends plays a major role in our ability to serve you.

Our most precious is people that are willing to commit to the rigors of training and responding day and night. If you have an interest in becoming part of our team please stop by the station for a tour and an explanation of how you can help. It's not easy but is very rewarding.

REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

When I became Police Chief in 2016, I committed to continuous improvement within our department. With the help of the members of our department, we continue to honor that goal. Highlighted below are just some of the things we've achieved recently.

Maine Law Enforcement Accreditation Program (MLEAP): After a concerted effort to

review our practices and policies, we were awarded accreditation status from the Maine Law Enforcement Accreditation Program. A program that requires us to meet or exceed 167 standards to ensure we operate



using current best practices, the agency is transparent, above reproach, and among the best in law enforcement

Community Outreach Liaison: Moving forward with our commitment to improving our response to mental health calls, we allied with York Police, Kittery Police, and York County Community Action to create a "Community Outreach Liaison" position. The focus of this position is to provide a meaningful service by supporting those in our community who may want to learn and utilize additional resources available in the area that go beyond the scope of what the town may have to offer.



We continue to work to improve our mental health response and have taken the One Mind Campaign pledge. One Mind Campaign is a program by the International **MUND** Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) that "...seeks to ensure successful interactions between law enforcement and persons with mental health conditions

and intellectual/developmental disabilities." We must show partnerships with mental health agencies, training, and policy, which we have accomplished.

School Resource Officer: We introduced Ryan Mazur as the School Resource Officer at Marshwood Middle School this school year. Although Ryan is not new to our department, he is growing in this new role. We are excited to see this position grow with the well-being of the students at the forefront of our mission.

Police Officer Wellness: Law enforcement affects mental and physical wellness. We continue to prioritize this and have teamed up with a Police Psychologist to provide "wellness checks" for our staff; these are not therapy sessions; they are discussions to ensure officers are working toward achieving the proper balance in all areas of their lives.

We can be proud of these achievements, and it is also important to acknowledge those that have served and continue to serve our community. Last year, long time, Eliot Police Officer Michael Grogan retired after over 25 years of service to the town of Eliot. We wish him the best in his next chapter.

Eliot Connects is a community group within Eliot that is actively working toward the betterment of our community spirit. Eliot Connects, a valuable partner, has organized two community events that have brought the town's first responders and the community closer. We appreciate your efforts and look forward to more fun-filled events!

REPORT OF THE REGISTRAR OF VOTERS

As of June 30, 2022, there were 6,626 registered voters in the Town of Eliot. Of the 6,626 registered voters 2,236 voters did not declare a political party and are considered unenrolled, 2,519 were enrolled in the Democratic Party, 165 were enrolled in the Green Independent Party, 5 were enrolled in the Libertarian Party and 1,701 were enrolled in the Republican Party.

We are always working on the upkeep of the voter registration list however the management is not as easy as it would seem. Laws prohibit the removal of a voter's name without the appropriate documentation necessary to support the removal so we rely heavily on the State Department of Motor Vehicle for their "Motor Voter" notifications that inform us of address changes for residents whether it be a change within town or to a new municipality within Maine. We also receive notification from other States when a resident has moved and completed an application for voter registration in their new place of residency.

Any resident may register to vote at the Town Clerk's Office during normal business hours or on Election Day. It is required that proof of identity as well as proof of residency be shown at the time of registration.

I would like to thank my staff as well as the residents that serve as election clerks on election day for their hard work and dedication to the election process. The tasks that come with the administration of voter registration and the preparation and execution of Town Meetings and Elections are demanding, making their continued dedication to serving so appreciated.

Dog Licensing

The State of Maine requires that all dogs be licensed within the Town that they are kept. To obtain a license for your dog you must show a current rabies vaccination certificate and a certificate of spaying or neutering if it applies to your dog.

The licenses are issued by the calendar year and the license fees are \$11.00 for a male or female and \$6.00 if the dog has been spayed or neutered. A late fee of \$25.00 will be assessed on renewal licenses after January 31st. The new licenses arrive from the State and can start being issued for the following year on October 15th, so register early to avoid the late fee.

Dog licenses can also be renewed online at <u>https://www1.maine.gov/online/dog_license/faq.html</u>, once we receive notification from the State that the license has been renewed our office will issue a tag and mail it to you with a copy of the license.
